1	EXPLORING PECHE ISLAND	<p>Windsor Discover the history of this 86-acre island located on the Detroit River. Hiram Walker used the island for a summer place and his buildings include a stable, large home, greenhouse and icehouse. Currently owned by the City of Windsor, Peche Island is a naturalized park with walking trails, canals and ruins. https://www.citywindsor.ca/residents/parksandforestry/City-Parks/Pages/Peche-Island-.aspx</p>
2	SAUGEEN RIVER CANOE ROUTE	<p>Hanover The Saugeen River originates in one of the highest points in southwestern Ontario and flows through rolling scenic countryside to Lake Huron, at Southampton. River conditions vary from broad placid sections to stretches with rapids and eddies, making the Saugeen ideal for family canoeing and for learning the basics of rapid water navigation. https://www.svca.on.ca/page.php?page=canoe</p>
3	GRAND RIVER PADDLING	<p>Grand River The multi-trail system runs through the largest watershed in southern Ontario boasting some of the most sought after and unique qualities found anywhere. The Grand River is a nationally designated Heritage River, home to over 80 species of fish and a paddlers dream with slow meandering portions interrupted by fast running strong current sections. https://brantwaterways.ca/Grand-River-Padding</p>
4	ELORA CATARACT TRAILWAY	<p>Elora and Fergus The 47-kilometre Elora Cataract Trailway links the Grand and Credit watersheds and follows the old Canadian Pacific railroad bed. It runs through rolling countryside east of Elora, through the historic community of Fergus and past Belwood Lake to the Forks of Credit Provincial Park at Cataract. https://www.grandriver.ca/en/outdoor-recreation/Elora-Cataract-Trailway.aspx</p>
5	RIVER CARNARD	<p>Essex County Experience a River Canard safari. See the unique wildlife and plants of Canada's southernmost county. Enjoy easy paddling on slow moving water. Camping is available overnight at secluded sites along the river. http://rivercanardcanoe.ca</p>
6	DAVENPORTAGE	<p>Toronto Canada's First Nations travelled a series of trails that crossed the land. One such trail, now referred to as the Davenport Trail, crossed Toronto and has survived the millennia. Portage the trail and paddle the rivers of Toronto on Sunday, October 27. http://www.davenportage.ca/2019.html</p>
7	CHASE THE COYOTE TRAIL RACE	<p>Orangeville – Mono Cliffs Provincial Park Chase the Coyote takes place at the beautiful Mono Cliffs Provincial Park minutes north of Orangeville. While chasing down the coyote make sure to take in the spectacular views and fall colours. The chase happens Saturday, September 21. http://www.chasethecoyote.com/</p>
8	NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY FOREST	<p>Centreton There are over 45km of hiking trails in the Northumberland County Forest including the eastern connection of the Oak Ridges Hiking Trail. The trails explore the rolling terrain and visit forest, wetland, woodland, savannah and tallgrass prairie. https://www.northumberland.ca/en/discovering-and-exploring/hiking.aspx</p>
9	HALIBURTON FOREST	<p>Haliburton Whether you visit Haliburton Forest for a day, overnight, or a whole week, the wide range of convenient amenities offers you everything you need onsite. 10	CARIBOU MOUNTAIN	<p>Temagami Take in the sites from the 100-foot Temagami tower that stands on top of Caribou Mountain.
